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


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# Debbie Turpen creates 'Zines'

Local artist Debbie Turpen has focussed on books, book-binding and art for most of her life, and has currently turned her attention to creating 'Zines', thus managing to merge all three.

According to Wikepedia, "A zine (/zi-n/ ZEEN; short for magazine or fanzine) is a small-circulation self-published work of original or appropriated texts and images, usually reproduced via a copy machine."

Zines began life as a subversive, do-ityourself medium in the early twentieth century, used by sci-fi enthusiasts, then punk, and on to marginalised voices to disseminate information. It is now used to publish creative work about whatever you love.

Debbie's art journey started in her home country of America, where she operated a business called 'Bound Expressions', selling book-binding materials performing a book-binding service and presenting Book-binding and Printing tutorials.

A qualified Environmental Engineer, Debbie also has a Bachelor of Visual Arts from the University of Auckland, where she majored in Print Media.

She first came to New Zealand in 1979, and returned here in 2001 with her husband Greg. They raised their two children here.

While studying for her arts degree, she fostered her love of books by working in bookshops.

From her studio in the Kawarau Gorge, she creates installations, paintings, fibre art, prints ..... "My studio is chokka!", she says.

From 2008 till 2019, Debbie focussed on painting, but when she discovered Zines, she says, "I just decided to go back to my printing and book-binding roots."

Debbie also writes poetry. She calls her Zines Hijinx'. Her first one was inspired by a poem, When Summer meets Winter, and she intends to continue the poetry/ art combination in her Zines.

Over recent years, she has enjoyed learning from Megan Huffadine and Michael Harlow, as well as working with friends Jenny Hill and Sue Lind.

I always feel humbled and honoured to be invited to participate in the Cromwell ANZAC service. The Cromwell branch of the RSA always hold a sombre and reflective service. They do an excellent job of including local service groups and children. I am always very proud of the way the children from our three schools respectfully participate in the service.

This year was a little bit different from previous years with the service held outside at the Cenotaph. It was a beautiful autumn day and it was lovely to see a strong turn out from our community. The service was slightly simplified and shortened with the omission of a speaker and of the Fine Thyme Belles who usually entertain us while the collection boxes circulate the hall. The inclusion of a singer to lead the National Anthems of New Zealand and Australia was lovely and Rachel Peters, with her beautiful voice, was the perfect choice for the occasion.

I always find myself reflecting on how conflict and war impacted my family during the service and through the day. Most people in my generation have grandfathers and great grandfathers who served in the first and second world wars and have connections to those who never made it back to their families. Separation, loss and the trauma of conflict on individuals and communities had profound affects on our society.

My grandmother was a young mother whose first husband was killed while serving in the British Army. She was living in London during the blitz. My uncle Jim was evacuated to family living in the country. My grandmother resisted attempts to be evacuated and remained in North London. Strong, stroppy women who don't like being told what to do obviously run in the family. She met my grandfather Einar Ellingsen during this time and they married before the end of the war. He was a Norwegian soldier serving alongside allied troops and taught American soldiers survival skills for Arctic conditions.

My mother was born in 1945 and spent the first seven years of her life in the Lofoten Islands in the north of Norway until my grandfather was released from the Norwegian army. They then returned to a war ravaged London. Her stories of life in Norway were in such stark contrast to London. My favourite being of my staunchly north London grandmother skiing to the local shop with the three children on the sled.

My family stories are not ANZAC stories but are still about connection and rememberance, stories passed down through generations and a reminder that we must never forget

Hopefully on a kinder weather day.



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Central Otago is known for its hot dry summers and provided water is available many plants and trees grow very well, especially fruit trees. (More on orchards in a later article)

There are many creeks flowing down the mountains in the vicinity of the Clutha valley. Most have small catchments and during the summer months many dry up and, on some occasions, go underground. These can still be accessed but a well needs to be dug down to the water, then it is lifted it to the surface either by pump or bucket.

Most of the larger creeks have had some of the water diverted for various uses.

Firewood Creek opposite Cromwell had a portion of its water diverted into reservoir to supply the town of Cromwell. This is not in use now however the remains of the reservoir can be seen on a plateau above where the two arms of the lake meet.

The Roaring Meg Creek was used to generate hydroelectric power. Its source is high on the southern end of the Pisa range and flowed south down a steep sided gully into the Kawarau River. Two dams were constructed in 1934, the first 3.6 km up the valley, and the water piped down to the first power station and another dam, then to a second power station built on the bank of the Kawarau River. These was built specifically to supply power to the Austral NZ dredge which was constructed to dredge for gold in the river between Cromwell to above Lowburn. The power stations are still in use today supplying power to the National Grid.

Sometimes water was brought great distances to where it was needed. An example is Bannockburn where the creeks in the vicinity did not have the supply of water needed to meet the demand of the goldfield. New water sources were investigated, and a good supply was found in Coal Creek, a contributary of the Nevis River. A company was formed, and work was started to dig a 35Km long water race in 1872 which has become known as the Carrick Race. After many issues, hold ups etc it was commissioned in 1878. Initially it supplied water to the gold mining areas around the wider Bannockburn area and is in use today supplying water to farms and vineyards.

They paddled up to 65ks in a day, and there were definite low points for the group and for individuals, as well as great fun.

"Over the five days the students faced many challenges and demonstrated pure grit and determination - it was an amazing effort by all involved.

Katrina stresses that trips such as this require not only the paddling, but planning, camping, organising and looking after themselves and each other.

One of the great benefits is that they come to a realisation that they can take on huge things,

and overcome the odds, by breaking a goal or a challenge down into smaller bites.

When they had all safely reached the sea, they were proud to say,

"Man! We actually did it!"

# Information on the famale falines heat cycle

Male and female cats reach sexual maturity from as young as 4 mths old so your kitten could easily get pregnant by 6mths old.

The female cats "heat Cycle" is called Seasonal Polyestrus which means they have estrous cycles repeatedly every 2-3 weeks during the Spring until late Autumn. But with the climate changing they can now have kittens from February throu to December. A female cat is pregnant for 63 -65 days. A female cat may mate 10 to 20 times on 1st day of her heat cycle then several more times over the next 4-6 days. This can result in multiple male partners so the kittens will have different fathers which is why some litters are multiple colours. A female cat can also get pregnant as soon as she has given birth to her kittens. This is why it is so important to get them speyed. There are 100's of stray and dumped kittens and cats in our local area's of Central Otago, Wanaka and Queenstown, these cats will hang around a food source and become a cat colony with groups of upto 15 cats. They become social within their feline group and will groom each other and help raise the kittens together. Sadly this is an environment which can spread disease like Cat Flu and Feline Aids which can then be passed onto your domestic feline.

You should worm your kitten every 2 weeks from age 2 weeks thru to 12 weeks. Then once a month for 3 months. From 6 months of age they should be done every 3 months for their entire lives. This also applies to dogs.

Kittens should get vaccinated from 8 weeks old with the 2nd vaccination 4 weeks later then a booster after one year. This will protect your cat for 3 years from Cat Flu, Calicivirus and Feline Panleukopenia.

There is no cure for Feline Aids however there is a vaccination available to help protect your feline against getting it. Speak to your local vet for more information on this vaccine.

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


