They buried him with his boots but no one could give him a name.

An early goldminer who died long ago, like many others in pursuit of gold, by the Mata-Au/Clutha River, was buried on Saturday.

His end came during the frenzied rush of the late 1800s when gold was easily found along the riverbanks and hopefuls clamoured to be a part of the action.

The living was rugged at best and likely so was the dying.

One hundred years on archaeologists working ahead of the Clyde Dam construction came across the miner and his boots and arranged for the careful transfer of both to Otago University's anatomy department.

After decades there, bio-archaeologist Professor Hallie Buckley, honorary research fellow, Dr Peter Petchey, and Dr Neville Ritchie, who originally discovered the remains, researched what they could of his history. All three were pallbearers at Saturday's service.

The man was thought to have likely drown and was aged around 30-40 years, but little else was known about him.


Professor Buckley says the work had been a team effort from archaeologists here and in the UK.

Over 200 people attended the service on Saturday with many walking with the procession from Cromwell Heritage Precinct to the cemetery.

Bob Scott, the newest member of the Cromwell Community Board, recently spent some days helping out with the grape harvest at local wine producer Burn Cottage Vineyard.

The vineyard is a small, 10-acre plot, certified organic and nestled into the hillside at Lowburn; the natural amphitheatre provides a perfect, sheltered environment for their bio-dynamic grape growing.

"I was told that Burn Cottage were a few hands short to harvest their Pinot Noir Grapes," says Bob. "I had some spare time on my hands, so was pleased to help." After the Pinot Noir grapes were all safely gathered, the Reisling grapes were next on the list.

"It was hard work and played havoc with the back, but it gave me an insight into just how hard the casual workers who normally fill these roles have to work for their money. I met some lovely people from the Cromwell region and many others from further afield who were travelling around New Zealand and earning their keep on the way."

Andy Crozier, sales manager for Burn Cottage, says, "There is no doubt that harvest 2022 was an outstanding vintage for all of us in the region. We have had to provide plans for the covid risk since 20020, so we had those in place, and we had a permanent team ready. We always bring in some casual pickers to cover harvest, and this year we are grateful to the locals who gave a hand."

Overall though, the vineyard management, together with owners Marquis and Dianne Sauvage, are just so excited by the quality and abundance of grapes this harvest, in their Burn Cottage and Bannockburn sites.

Bob says, "It was very interesting to get an idea of how the industry works, the difficulties they have in attracting workers for a relatively short contract and the problems they also have in finding local accommodation for workers from outside the region and from overseas".

He adds, "A great experience and one I'd certainly like to repeat next year."

We've heard from many locals whose relatives were lost during those hard times, and for whatever reason, didn't have the burial they deserved. Mr Goldminer is at rest now, his work is done."

I was fortunate enough to travel to Victoria last week for a family wedding and it was interesting to view the pandemic from a place that has been consistently a couple of months ahead of New Zealand.

At first glance, Melbourne was like I remember it being the last time I was there four years ago.

Masks were not a common sight at all unless you were on the public transport; then people did seem to take them seriously. I couldn't tell whether that was from common sense given how we were packed in or if it was enforced. Shops, bars etc were just like they used to be, without masks being worn by shoppers or servers alike. This surprised me a bit given the death rate in Victoria which, at 319/m is not quite double New Zealand's at 185. Melbourne also went through far longer periods of lockdown than we did so I had thought there may have been a bit more precautionary behaviour, but it appears not.

I had one night out in Melbourne where things seemed a bit quieter than I remembered them from previous visits but the next morning was where I did get quite a shock. I love getting up early in big cities and watching them wake up and on past visits to Melbourne, the place was humming by 6.30-7 am. I hit the laneways looking for good coffee around that time to find most of the cafes near empty or in some places, totally empty. The difference couldn't have been starker than previous experiences.

I asked my niece who has lived there for twenty years why she thought this was and she reckons its down to people still working from home; avoiding the cost and hassle of commutes now they have got used to the alternative.

While this change may not affect us directly in Central, it is an indication perhaps of how work life has changed and may result in more folk looking to our place as a viable alternative to city madness.

Pillars to Dam the Kawarau River ready to fall Photo R W Murray Collection

As mentioned in an earlier article the early settlers diverted water from the many streams flowing down from the mountains on either side of the valley initially for mining, now attention was turned to farming. As a source of water, they looked to the Clutha and Kawarau rivers. The challenge was to lift the water from these rivers up to the land. Various types of pumps had been used in other countries for many years, all required an energy source to drive them.

In the Kawarau below the current Mining Centre there was a section of the river known as the Kawarau Rapid where the river level dropped.

were Several groups considering schemes in this area. They all had a similar idea; dam the river just above the rapids, raise the river level and divert water via a channel to a pump house.



Some water would drive a turbine which coupled to a pump, the pumped water was to be taken across the river in a pipe known as a rising main to a holding dam. From here via open water races to irrigate the land between the mouth of the Kawarau Gorge to Cromwell and as far as Lowburn.

There was a lot of friction between the groups. Percy Sargood, a wealthy Merchant and Philanthropist from Dunedin, appointed himself chairperson of one of the groups. He financed the project and chose the design. This design was not suitable for this part of the river and was plagued with problems from the beginning. This design was to build two vertical concrete pillars, one on each side of the river. Then topple them into the river to form a dam and raise the level by 5 meters and divert some of the river flow into a channel to a pump house.

Every thing was built. The first pillar fell on cue however was moved from the intended position by the current of the river. The second one failed to fall. A successful attempt was made several days later. It too was taken out of position by the current. The river level failed to rise anywhere near the intended amount. After much argument between the groups a truce was reached, a compromise was met and modifications were made and it delivered some water, no where near the intended volume.

After 18 years of service to Cromwell College, in various administrative roles, Megan Christensen has resigned as office manager to begin her new life in Dunedin, working at Otago University.

She came to the school from Adelaide, with a background in hotel management for a large hotel chain.

Her first employment was for five hours a week as the International Home Stay coordinator. In fact, over the years, she has hosted 13 international students herself.

For Megan, coming to a small town, working with children, and learning the education terminology in a school were challenges. The office was totally manual, school reports were hand-written, everybody paid in cash, and a roll monitor went to every class with a clipboard. Now everything is computerised with transactions processed by the push of a button. Reports are e-mailed home, teachers mark the roll online and the system automatically contacts parents, and there are no longer hundreds of children in the office to pay cash for a school trip. The office role is quite a lot easier. However, the job content now for an office administrator has probably grown tenfold.

Megan says, "The school office is always very busy - lots going on. You need to be able to multi-task and be putting out many fires at the same time. A good memory is a must. I pride myself that I can name all the students at school with the exception of the Years 7's and can also name most of their parents." She remembers that her most challenging time was when the administration block was being re-built, and the principal, three assistant principals, account department and office all ran form a porticom building.

"I'm really sad to be leaving and will miss everyone staff, students and parents," says Megan, adding, "I have loved working here. No two days were ever the same. The staff team is like family; everyone looks out for each other. The senior leadership team and the office team had a very close relationship and we ran things like a well-oiled machine. It was really enjoyable working with students and fun to see how much they change over their time at school. I hope I have managed to impact their lives in a positive way."

Principal and staff say they have never worked with such an efficient person, and wonder at her impressive memory.

Mason Stretch, Principal, says, that he is most grateful for Megan's support of him fourteen years ago, when he was a new principal at the college.

"That, and her efficiency, her initiative, her capacity for mahi along with her sense of calm and her gentle reminders of what I've forgotten."

As Megan says, after dealing with over 300 staff, 2,000 students and their parents over the last 18 years, "Life in a school office is never boring!"


